Margaret Thatcher, RIP

News of Margaret Thatcher's death Monday at age 87 brought a snarky tweet from Donna Brazile, the current vice chairwoman of the Democratic National Committee who managed Al Gore's 2000 presidential campaign and doesn't understand what all the fuss is about.

"Okay, what did the #ironlady do to advance Great Britain and the world?" wrote Ms. Brazile. "Did she leave lasting footprints for women in politics?"

Times, Mrs. Thatcher, who served as
Britain's prime minister from 1979 to
1990, "pulled her country back from 35
years of left-wing government, led it to
victory in the Falklands war and helped
guide the United States and the Soviet
Union through the cold war's difficult
last years."

According to conservative economist Arthur Laffer, "it took the election of Margaret Thatcher to break the chokehold of the labor unions on the political system that was gradually converting the proud British empire into a third world state." He adds: "Thatcher liberated the United Kingdom from the militant unions, privatized assets, got salary demands under control, and cut tax rates.
